Clear information about investment and local population needs


Principles for service transformation

Exploring CORC data

- Published since the last forum:
 - The relationship between child and parent-reported shared decision making and child-, parent-, and clinician-reported treatment outcome
 - Associations between evidence based practice and mental health outcomes in child and adolescent mental health services
 - Interpreting standardized and idiographic outcome measures in CAMHS: what does change mean and how does it relate to functioning and experience?
 - The association between ethnicity and care pathway for children with emotional problems in routinely collected child and adolescent mental health services data



Implications for practice: Measuring what matters (Jacob et al in press)

- Below are examples of indicators relating to the sort of goals agreed by children, young people and families accessing services
- Goals Based Outcomes (GBO) may be useful in relation to bespoke goals agreed

Research Strategy

- Characterising the CORC dataset:

 - An examination of co-morbidity in the dataset;
 - An exploration of outcome measures used with different groups
- Missing data analysis

- An exploration of clinically meaningful change; beyond significant differences
- Service use of LAC

CORC for Schools

Ofsted recommend that schools should be 'working with others to provide interventions for pupils with mental health problems' with 'regular reviews to assess the effectiveness of the provision and lead to changes where necessary'

- Help schools use outcome measures to: deliver young person-centred services; track the impact of emotional wellbeing support; and interpret and act on the information collected.
- School reports will look at the relationship between emotional health and other factors e.g. attainment, attendance
- We are now working piloting our reports with schools to make them as practical, accessible and useful as possible

CORC Voluntary Pioneers

- For voluntary sector organisations with turnover of under £500k
- Trial CORC approaches for free
- Receive a CORC report based on six months of data
- Build CORC understanding about the challenges and opportunities of routine outcome monitoring in smaller organisations




Cross Sector Data Linkage - project

- Supporting areas to develop a linked local area data set to monitor the implementation of strategies to improve wellbeing
- Support to CCGs, local authorities, specialist commissioning teams and Health & Wellbeing Boards working with their local providers of services in:
 - Selecting the best outcome measures and indicators
 - linking data across agencies and organisations
 - Feedback of cross agency and organisational trends in outcomes and performance
 - Allow and benefit from the use of data for research




What do we mean by data linkage?


Consider a young person, Jonny, age 15



Note: Some person-level data from local record systems are collated nationally




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CORC for Commissioning

- To promote a collaborative approach to the use of outcome and experience measures which draws on the expertise of
 - service users
 - service providers
 - service commissioners
- To engage across the system
- And in all phases of the cycle





Ways in which CORC supports commissioners

Developing outcomes frameworks

Intelligence about a range of measures suitable for different purposes

Advice on incorporating outcome measures into contract specifications and contract monitoring regimes

Collaborative work with commissioner and local partners/ market to identify measures for use (Facilitation of stakeholder meetings/ meet the buyer events)

Analysis of outcome data – for needs analysis or reviewing service impact (Commissioner reports with breakdowns by provider and CORC benchmarks)

Support on interpreting and discussing flawed data meaningfully (MINDFUL approach) as part of contract management discussion or deep dive data review



Support to providers – training, integrating the use of measures, improving data collection rates and data quality

Embedding outcome monitoring – more throughout the day





Improving your collection of outcome measure data

- The data collection process must be simple and minimally disruptive... (Boswell et al 2015)
- Mentoring and hands-on support to review ROM collection processes and identify changes to improve your collection rates
- Using a systematic approach to process mapping and redesign will help identify the points in the process which will yield the biggest improvements for the least amount of change
- Shows where process 'waste' is occurring that can be easily eliminated



















Free support for CORC Voluntary Sector Pioneers

The CORC Voluntary Sector Pioneers project is an opportunity for smaller voluntary sector organisations to trial CORC approaches for free—and for CORC to find out more about the challenges and opportunities of routine outcome monitoring in smaller organisations. The project is open to not-for-profit organisations with an annual turnover of under £500,000 p.a., who will be able to access CORC support over a six-month data collection period and receive a trial CORC report.
